ACTIONS OF COUNCIL

- Authorized payment of \$23,342.45 to Pipe Services Corporation for sewer televising work.
- Authorized payment of \$18,997.44 to Pipe Services Corporation for storm pipe investigations.
- Adopted the Complete Streets Policy Resolution to assist in becoming a Bicycle Friendly Community.
- Approved a contract for assistance from the Urban Land Institutes Technical Assistance Program for strategic planning.
- Approved authorization to transfer funds for a grant writing fee from the Stadium Maintenance Fund to the Lion Foundation.
- Approved authorization to enter an agreement with the Capital Region COG and the Cohen Group for the auditing and negotiating of the Verizon Franchise Agreement.
- Approved hosting the Library 5K Loop on Saturday, July 23, 2016.
- Adopted a policy stating "Trick-Or-Treat Night in Camp Hill Borough shall occur from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on the date of Halloween, October 31st of each year, unless October 31st falls on a Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, in which case Trick-Or-Treat Night activities shall occur from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on the Thursday prior to October 31st".
- Approved authorization to advertise the Borough's paving contract for 2016.
- Approved authorization for a resolution to support the COG in calling on the state to install protection devices in grassy medians.
- Approved authorization for a resolution increasing fees from \$15 to \$20 per tax certification.

YARD WASTE RECYCLING FACILITY INFORMATION

New hours are effective Monday, October 17, 2016. The new hours are 8:30 am to 3:00 pm Monday, Wednesday and Friday and 8:30 am to 4:30 pm on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. The Compost Facility drop off area will remain operational until Monday, December 12, 2016 when it will be closed through the winter season. The facility may close earlier due to inclement weather. Please do not deposit any materials other than leaf and woody waste.

LEAF COLLECTION

Curbside leaf collection is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, November 1, 2016. Leaf collection occurs the day after your regularly-scheduled trash pick-up day.

- Leaves may be raked into the street five (5) days prior to your regular scheduled curbside collection schedule. Leaves should be windrowed along the curb or edge of the roadway.

PUBLIC WORKS

- All leaves prior to the November 1st start date can be brought to the Compost Facility or can remain on your property until the curbside leaf collection begins.
- DO NOT blow or rake grass, sticks or other yard debris in the street at any time throughout the year.
- DO NOT place branches, grass clippings, rocks or other debris in with leaves. Any foreign objects placed in leaf piles may result in fines and suspension of leaf collection service.
- DO NOT leave cars parked along the street the day of your leaf collection.
- DO NOT park vehicles on or near leaf piles.
- PLEASE remember that inclement weather will delay the leaf collection schedule.

Residents are encouraged to take leaves to the Compost Facility located next to the Public Works Facility at 422 South 24th Street. Beginning Monday, October 17th for the Fall Leaf Collection Season the Compost Facility hours will be Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 8:30 am to 3:00 pm and Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

SANITARY SEWER

Do not flush swiffers, cloth rags, baby wipes, baby cloths, dental floss or other similar materials into the sanitary sewer system. These items can cause clogs, damage sewage pumps and increase maintenance costs.

Property owners are responsible for the lateral and the building sewer. The lateral extends from the sewer main in the street to the Right-of-Way. The building sewer extends from the Right-of-Way to the home. Sewer customers are reminded to keep traps in homes/businesses filled with water. This will reduce sewer odors from entering the living and working spaces of the property.

The sewer main will be checked by Public Works Staff and flushed if necessary. If there is no problem in the sewer main the homeowner should call a plumber. Please call the Borough Hall at 737-3456 if you experience a slow or no-working toilet and they will contact the Public Works Department.

WINTER MAINTENANCE

Plowing borough streets after a snow event is a time consuming process. Following a few simple guidelines can make the operator's job safer and more efficient:

- Pay attention to local forecasts as winter weather and road conditions can change very quickly. If it is necessary for you to drive, please do so responsibly.
- Minimize driving as much as possible during and immediately after a snow event. The fewer the vehicles on the roadway allows the roadway to be cleared more quickly and efficiently.
- Remove vehicles and trailers from the street prior to a winter event. This will allow the operator to clear the street from edge-to-edge.
- Remove basketball hoops from the borough right-of-way.
- Please keep a safe operating distance from all vehicles providing winter maintenance.
- If you have a mailbox along the roadway, periodically check to ensure that the post and mailbox are in good condition. The post and mailbox must be sturdy enough to withstand snow coming off the plow blade.
- Never push, blow or shovel snow into a cleared roadway.
- Never attempt to stop or flag down a truck driver while plowing.
- Clearing a space along the curb or edge of road before your driveway will reduce the amount of the snow placed in your driveway.
- Wait until the street is completely cleared before shoveling the end of your driveway.
- Operator's will often make multiple passes on the same street.
- Plow drivers cannot direct snow as it comes off of a plow. Plow blades are fixed to dump snow to the right.

A REMINDER FROM THE CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT...

RESPONSIBILITY FOR REMOVAL; TIME LIMIT

Within eight (8) hours after snow or ice has stopped falling, sidewalks must be cleared their

entire length with a path no less than three feet wide. The hours between 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. are not figured into this period of eight hours. Of equal importance: it is prohibited for snow, ice and/or liquids to be shoveled, blown, plowed or discharged into the streets or alleys; this is a citable offense.

OUTDOOR BURNING § 66-7 EXCEPTION TO RESTRICTIONS ON BURNING

Patio and yard wood-burning units used as chimneas, patio warmers, and other portable wood-burning devices used for recreational purposes, provided the following shall apply: (1) only clean wood may be used and burned, (2) patio and yard wood-burning units must be located at least 50 feet from the nearest structure which is not on the same property as the patio wood-burning unit and (3) use of patio and yard wood-burning units shall not cause a nuisance to neighbors.

FIRE PREVENTION § 113-11 SMOKE DETECTORS AND MEANS OF EGRESS

Smoke detectors save lives. But did you know most homeowners and renters do not check their detectors or replace spent batteries? Smoke detectors must be kept in working order according to the Borough Code. To insure the safety of yourself, family, friends and pets, check smoke detectors in your home annually to make sure they are functioning properly and replace the batteries at the same time. Also, do not paint over smoke detectors or obstruct them in any manner. Of equal importance is to maintain a clear path of escape (egress) from homes and buildings in the event of an emergency. This means keeping entrances/exits and fire escapes free of obstructions (furniture, plants, rubbish, garbage, etc.) that would impede occupants from evacuating quickly and delay emergency responders from entering the premises.

ANIMALS § 71-11 DISTURBANCE OF PEACE

Any animal or bird in the custody of a borough resident which makes any noise continuously and/or incessantly for a period of ten (10) minutes or makes such noise intermittently for ½ hour or more is considered a nuisance.

ANIMALS § 71-12 NUISANCES

When not confined to the owner's premises, all animals must be under physical control of their owner or custodian and constrained at all times. Any animal waste deposited on the ground other than the animal owner's own private property must be removed immediately and disposed of properly.

IPMC § 304.3 PROPERTY IDENTIFICATION

A number of homes and businesses throughout the Borough have unreadable or missing property numbers. Under Section 304.3 of the International Property Maintenance Code (IPMC), building numbers must be a minimum of four (4) inches in height and readable from the street by emergency responders. Following the Code and keeping your home or business properly marked, assists Police, Fire and EMS to respond rapidly and effectively. Also, help us to help you by keeping building numbers free of obstructions. In an emergency situation, seconds count.

VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC § 190-21

The parking of boats, trailers, motor homes, travel trailers and commercial motor vehicles, except those of the light delivery type, not exceeding ¾ ton's capacity shall be prohibited on all streets in the Borough of Camp Hill in any residential district according to the zoning classifications and regulations set forth in Chapter 200, Zoning, of this Code.

GREASE INTERCEPTORS

Grease interceptors and automatic grease removal devices shall be maintained in accordance with this code and the manufacturer's installation instructions. Grease interceptors and automatic grease removal devices shall be regularly serviced and cleaned to prevent the discharge of oil, grease, and other substances harmful or hazardous to the building drainage system, the public sewer, the private sewage disposal system or the sewage treatment plant or processes. All records of maintenance, cleaning and repairs shall be available for inspection by the code official. All residents should refrain from placing any

As Chief of the Camp

Hill Fire Department I would like to remind everyone that home fires are more likely to occur in winter than during any other season. As temperatures fall it becomes necessary to heat your home. Heating equipment is the leading cause of residential fires during the months of December, January, and February. Winter storms can also interrupt electrical service causing people to turn to other heating sources that further increase the risks.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, heating equipment fires accounted for 16% of all reported home fires in 2009-2013 and 19% of home fire deaths. Space heaters are the type of heating equipment most often involved in home heating fires. The leading factor contributing to ignition for home heating fires deaths (56%) was heating equipment too close to things that can burn such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattresses, or bedding. The leading factor contributing to home heating fires (30%) was failure to clean, principally from solid-fueled heating equipment, primarily chimneys.

By following the fire prevention measures listed below, you can significantly reduce the risk of fire in your home and enjoy a safe winter season.

FIREPLACES, FURNACES, AND PORTABLE HEATERS

- Keep all objects at least three feet away from heating equipment such as the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater. Have a three foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Before you go to sleep, be sure that your fireplace fire is out. Never close your damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. A closed damper will help the fire to heat up again and will force toxic carbon monoxide into the house.


- If synthetic logs are used, follow the directions on the package. Never break a synthetic log apart to quicken the fire or use more than one log at a time. These logs can burn unevenly, releasing higher levels of carbon monoxide.
- Make sure that the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Always allow ashes to cool before placing them in a metal container and keep the container a safe distance from your home.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected by a qualified service professional.
- If you use an electric heater, do not overload the electrical circuit. Select an extension cord that is the same size or larger than the appliance cord.
- Avoid using space heaters in areas where they may come in contact with water.
- Always remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or if you are going to be leaving your home.

FIRE HYDRANTS

- Please assist the fire department by clearing snow and debris away from the fire hydrants on your street. Delays in locating fire hydrants and getting water on a fire will endanger the lives of both civilians and firefighters.

LAST BUT BY NO MEANS LEAST

- Plan and practice a home escape plan with your family.
- If windows are used as emergency exits in your home, be sure that they all open easily.
- Install a Carbon Monoxide detector if you don't have one already. Carbon Monoxide is a tasteless, odorless, and invisible gas which is absorbed into the body 200 times faster than oxygen. Gas fireplaces, gas

SCHAEFFER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL UPDATE

The Borough currently has a supply of bricks if residents are interested in having a brick from Schaeffer School. The Borough has a limited amount so residents are asked to please come to the Borough Office and see Bill Albright or Patrick Dennis and they will give each resident a brick.

Bricks are limited to one per family. The Borough wants to be sure that everyone who would like a brick receives one.

After many months of planning, the Borough has contracted with a qualified contractor to begin the demolition of Schaeffer Elementary School. The contractor was given 120 days to complete the project with the contract being signed in the middle of September. There is remedial work inside the building that must be completed before the demolition can begin. It is very important to remember the building is condemned and is unsafe and must not be occupied by anyone other than the contractor. The work inside the building is expected to be completed in early November. Following the completion of the remedial work, large track excavators will be mobilized to the site and will be used to take the building down and load the debris.

At this time we believe there will be minimal road closures as part of the demolition process. The contractor may close 28th Street between Logan and Walnut. The Borough asks residents to avoid the sidewalks immediately adjacent to the school and give the contractor the room they need to perform the work. We ask that you avoid driving on 28th Street between Logan and Walnut Street as the contractor will be using 28th Street at a construction entrance. Safety is very important throughout the demolition and cleanup process. The work is expected to be completed by the end of the year with the exception of seeding and restoration.

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CAMP HILL SCHOOL DISTRICT CELEBRATES 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF BELOVED OUTDOOR EDUCATION PROGRAM

It all started with Hoover Elementary School teacher Mary Ann McHale.

In 1968, she got permission to take her 6th grade class on an outdoor education trip to Camp Tanalo, a beautiful Pocono Mountain camp located in Monroe County. The kids loved it and a tradition was born! When that camp shuttered in 1974, Mrs. McHale moved her trip up north to Camp Sno-Hill in Wayne County.

Over the next 10 years, the trip grew and Eisenhower Elementary students were asked to join in. Not to be outdone, Schaffer and Lincoln Elementary Schools started their own tradition, heading to Camp Shikellamy located on Clark's Creek in Dauphin County.

In 1979, the Camp Hill School District combined the two programs, sending all district sixth graders to Camp Sno-Hill. According to Dr. William Freed, Camp Hill School Superintendent at that time, combining the two programs was helpful. "Bringing the sixth graders from four different schools together at camp gave them a way to get to know each other," he said. This made the transition to one big class in the single Camp Hill Junior High School the following year that much easier, he said.

In addition to Dr. Freed and Miss McHale, other Camp Hill educators and volunteers, including Essie Witmer, Dick Lundvall, Jay Cleveland, Harold Hengst, Jane Santor, Jim

Ramsey, Reed Ernst, Terry Boylan, Mike Nelson Sr., Rob Coffman, Chuck Johnson, Tom Decker and Joy Grant, to name a few, invested tremendous time and energy into growing the program during these years.

In 1980, the district moved the trip back to the Poconos, to Camp Tegawitha, and for the next 16 years, Camp Hill sixth graders enjoyed this scenic camp. We found our current location, Camp Canadensis, also located in Monroe County, when Camp Tegawitha closed in 1995.

Over the past 50 years, approximately 4,500 Camp Hill kids have experienced the joy of getting their feet wet in mountain creeks, the thrill of hiking through pristine forests and the excitement of studying the abundant plant and animal life of beautiful northeastern Pennsylvania. The evening games -- steeple chase and tribal competition, to name just a few -- have been around since the days of Camp Sno-Hill and our students still enthusiastically sing many of the same camp songs their parents and grandparents did!

Julia Raich, a current 8th grader, talked about the many activities and games played at camp. "My personal favorites were the Tribal War and Steeple Chase but I also really enjoyed the night hike and campfire; we got to hike through the woods, and end up at a huge campfire where we sang songs and played games," she said. She said that the camp experience taught her many lessons about sciences and nature, which sparked interests she continues to have today.

Lulu Wilson, now a junior at Camp Hill High School, said that she keeps the wooden medallion made by each Canadensis camper hanging over the mirror in her room. "Just seeing it every day brings back so many happy memories," she said. "I especially loved the stream hike. It was so cold that year, and we were soaked, but we didn't care -- it was so much fun!"

Camp itself is brief, now lasting only three days and two nights. But speaking from experience as a camper myself (Camp Tegawitha) and observation as a parent (Camp Canadensis) and program director since 2005, the memories from it last forever!



In 1979 AARP developed a program called "55 ALIVE" to help keep older drivers independent, safe, healthy and confident while on the road. The program continues to evolve with 6 revisions, the latest in 2014, known since as the AARP Smart Driver Course. The course is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and US territories. The course is designed for per-

sons age 50 or older, but any licensed driver may attend. A Participant Guidebook features reader friendly print, full color pages, an easy to follow format and supplemental course videos. Additional, trained volunteer instructors provide state-specific information for location where class is held. At course end each participant is given a Certificate of Completion. It is up to the participant's automobile insurance company to determine if a discount on premiums is warranted. The Initial Course is 8 hours on two days, and the refresher course is one 4 hour session on a single day. To maintain an insurance premium discount, the course must be repeated within 3 years.

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



With nearly 1000 programs worldwide, Camp Hill's selection for this prestigious game was monumental. The Camp Hill Challenger program faced Grand Junction, Colorado for a friendly exhibition game prior to the International and United States Championship games. Challenger baseball is a division of Little League baseball for school-aged children up to age 22 with mental and/or physical challenges. In a non-competitive and completely safe environment where no score is kept, developmentally and physically challenged kids can enjoy the great American pastime of baseball.

SCHOOL PERFORMANCE PROFILE

The PA School Performance Profile (SPP) has been developed by the Pennsylvania Department of Education for several purposes which include: provide a building level score for teachers as part of the Educator Effectiveness System, provide parents with comparative measures for the school/district of residence, provide the public with the academic performance measures of each school across the State, and offer a resource for LEAs to communicate and compare performance, and analyze performance indicators as related to achievement, and encourage best practice.

The School Performance Profile is based on the following academic achievement indicators:

- Percent proficient or advanced on the PSSA's in mathematics, reading, science and writing.

- Percent competent or advanced on industry certification exams (NOCTI or NIMS).
- Percent proficient or advanced on PSSA grade 3 reading.
- Advanced Placement achievement.
- SAT performance.

Over the past several months, we have been reviewing the data provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Education to verify accuracy of the information which was gathered from PIMS data regarding our demographics, attendance, graduation rates, and academic achievement information in general. We received our SPP scores in October. These scores, and other assessment data were presented to the School Board at the October Board Meeting.
